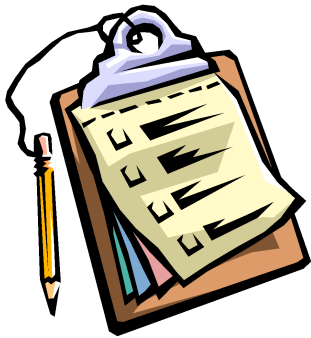

The Outdoor School Checklist

THREE MONTHS BEFORE ARRIVAL

- ❖ Call The Outdoor School to schedule parent slide show or receive the link to the slide show
- ❖ Confirm number of students attending
- ❖ Begin to organize Parent Chaperone Cabin Leaders. Email the Director if you are unsure how many you need. This can be done sooner to confirm parent schedules.
- ❖ Call local high schools to schedule cabin leaders **if needed**.

ONE MONTH BEFORE ARRIVAL



- ❖ Cabin leaders should be selected and trained - contact the Education Director if you need any assistance in this process.
- ❖ Send links to parent and student handbooks home
- ❖ Collect the completed student health and emergency information forms
- ❖ Invoice #1 for 90% of contracted students is due
- ❖ READ this handbook – any questions, comments, or concerns call the Education Director at (904) 703-0677

THREE WEEKS BEFORE ARRIVAL

Mission Statement

The Outdoor School facilitates the development of community and environmental stewardship in students through a direct experience with nature. We broaden students' horizons by inspiring a sense of wonder and curiosity about our dynamic, diverse, and interdependent local and global environments.

Objectives

- o Students will gain knowledge of botany, geology, wildlife biology, fire ecology, water science, astronomy, and Chumash culture through experiential learning.
- o Students will gain a new understanding of their place and responsibility in our environment through hands-on activities guided by naturalists.
- o Students will acquire teamwork skills through the course of their studies.

You, the Teacher, at ODS

Teachers play an integral role in The Outdoor School. In fact, teachers started The Outdoor School in 1957.

At The Outdoor School, you are a(n)

- ✗ PARTICIPANT – the students want to share this adventure with you. Your participation will enhance this experience for both you and your students.
- ✗ ROLE MODEL – you will model good learning for the students on curriculum hikes. The students will turn to you as an example of how to behave in this new setting.
- ✗ INFIRMARY ATTENDENT – there are scheduled times when a teacher must be in the Health Lodge to treat any injuries of general malaise. Teachers are also responsible for administering any student medications. We have a health supervisor on staff but a teacher will need to be in the health lodge throughout the program.
- ✗ SUPERVIOR – specifically, teachers will help supervise recreation, showers, and morning and evening bed checks.
- ✗ MEMBERS OF OUR COMMUNITY – the Education Director, Naturalists, and teachers will work together to provide a positive, educational experience for the students. We strive to communicate openly and honestly with each other all week and appreciate your assistance in this.

Where are We Going?

The Outdoor School is located at Rancho Alegre Boy Scout camp, which is on the north facing slopes of the Santa Ynez Mountains, near Lake Cachuma. The site is approximately 40 miles south of Santa Maria and 20 miles north of Santa Barbara, on Highway 154.

What Facilities are There?

The teacher areas are a private entrance area off the main cabins for the students. Each area has its own twin bed and a full bathroom. You will need to bring your own twin beds.

In addition to the teachers' there are four dormitories split into 8 cabins, the dining hall and kitchen, swimming pool (open seasonally and dependent on school's insurance), and archery range. The buildings have electricity and are heated and have air condition.

The Outdoor School Community

- ❑ NATURALISTS are the teachers at The Outdoor School. They conduct hikes, lead special activities, supervise meals and guide campfires. The Lead Naturalist is responsible for The Outdoor School when the Education Director is not available.
- ❑ EDUCATION DIRECTOR is in charge of the day to day operations of The Outdoor School including supervising naturalists, cabin leaders, and assisting the teachers with student supervision and discipline. If the Education Director is not available then the Lead Naturalist is in charge.
- ❑ ADMINISTRATIVE DIRECTOR manages the accounts and attendance.
- ❑ KITCHEN STAFF cook all meals (including desserts) and need lots of 'thank you' and 'that food was awesome'. The Kitchen Director is responsible for accommodating the students' food allergies and dietary restrictions.
- ❑ MAINTENANCE maintains all the buildings and facilities on property.
- ❑ CABIN LEADERS stay in the cabins with the students at night, accompanies one hiking group on hikes, assists with meal set-up and clean-up, and escort the students everywhere (more information below).
- ❑ CLASSROOM TEACHERS...well...that is you!!!



Cabin Leaders

Cabin Leaders are a VERY IMPORTANT part of The Outdoor School experience. Their attitudes, enthusiasm, and maturity will guide your learners and support the program. It is the responsibility of participating teachers to recruit, select and train the Cabin Leaders who will be coming with their group.

If high school cabin leaders are necessary, it is the responsibility of the teacher to contact their local high school to arrange cabin leaders for the week they are attending. Please contact The Outdoor School when these arrangements are made so we can set up cabin leader training. Also call if you need assistance in finding cabin leaders. Discipline of the cabin leaders is the responsibility of the teacher who made arrangements with the high school – the Education Director will assist with this discipline.

Please carefully consider the Cabin Leader responsibilities below and consult the Cabin Leader Handbook before choosing these individuals. As always, if you have any questions or comments, feel free to contact us.

- **The Cabin Leaders should be parents, high school juniors or seniors, or in some cases school staff. In cases where the Cabin Leaders are over the age of 18, California state policies will require them to be fingerprinted and/or have a background check and take a 2 hour online training.**
- We require at least one Cabin Leader for each cabin. In weeks where there will be less than 100, plan on recruiting six to eight Cabin Leaders (three to four males and three to four females). In cases where there will be more than 100 students/week, plan on recruiting ten Cabin Leaders.
- All cabin leaders are expected to stay on-site the entire duration of the program. If a Cabin Leader needs to leave they will need their departure to be pre-approved by the Education Director and must sign out appropriately. Cabin Leaders under 18 and/or in high school will need their guardian to provide transportation if they need to leave sometime during the week

Responsibilities

- Assist Naturalists with supervision and activities on curriculum hike
- Monitor safety and model good behavior in the cabins
- Respond responsibly to student needs
- Supervise meal set-up, clean-up and behavior

- o Communicate any concerns or questions with the Naturalists, Education Director and Teachers
- o Escort the students to activities on time
- o Create a sense of community in their cabin and hiking groups

The Learning Environment



It is our belief that The Outdoor School should be a place for all learners. We strive to create an environment built on self-respect, respect for others, and for the environment. We are avid practitioners of positive role modeling, teamwork, and we make every effort to foster the development of intrinsic motivation and joy in all of the participants.

We also use positive reinforcement to extrinsically reward what we see as stellar behavior in the form of “stars” and the “Golden Star Award” which is given out at the end of each week. As is often the case when trying to balance the needs of individuals with the needs of a group, we sometimes are forced to rely on an extrinsic system of discipline to help students better understand their role as learners at The Outdoor School. When a student repeatedly demonstrates inappropriate behavior, s/he will receive “checks”.

- 1st check – a formal warning and discussion about inappropriate behavior with a Naturalist. Participating teachers will be alerted of this warning.
- 2nd check– the student loses the ability to choose his/her next Special Activity and teachers are asked to intervene in the developing situation.
- 3rd check – the student misses recreation time or a Special Activity and the learner creates a behavior contract with the Education Director or Program Coordinator.
- 4th check – the student misses a Special Activity and/or recreation time and a phone call is made to the student’s parents to discuss his/her behavior issues.
- 5th check– the parents of the child are notified and the child is sent home.

Any student or students who exhibits extreme or unsafe behavior such as fighting or intentionally harming others physically or emotionally, intentionally endangering themselves or others, participating in cabin raids or other violations of personal space, stealing, bringing or using knives or controlled substances will be immediately removed from The Outdoor School by parents or their school’s administration. We reserve the right to adjust our policies after consulting with teachers and, though it is not our intention to remove youth from the program, we do reserve the right to have any person or persons removed from the property, at any time, if their behavior is deemed dangerous or inappropriate. If you or a parent has any questions regarding the learning environment at The Outdoor School, please feel free to contact us.

Early Dismissal and Guests

If a student has to leave the program early for any reason (discipline, emergencies, special events, etc.) it is the responsibility of his/her teacher to ensure that the child is picked up by a responsible individual (preferably the guardian) and is signed out in the binder located in the Health Lodge. If you would like to have school staff or guests visit the program other than parents (which are not 8 allowed) please clear it with the Education Director ahead of time and sign them in and out at the Health Lodge. All visitors must wear a wrist band, located with the binders in the Health Lodge, and you assume responsibility for their behavior/activities during their stay.

Refund Policy

A student that attends The Outdoor School in conjunction with their public or private school will owe the respective fees appropriated for each student (Outdoor School rate is \$285.00 per student, payable by the student's guardian. For the guardian this rate may fluctuate depending on other costs designated by the attending institution (such as transportation fees). This payment by the guardian is due to the child's public or private school at the appropriate date designated by that institution. The institution will then owe The Outdoor School for the number of students that attend OR must pay for 90% of the contracted number of students (if contracted enrollment goes below 90% of the expected student population designated on the contract). Final payment is due 14 days before the first day of attending the program. Payments not received by that date are subject to a 2% late fee. Payments every thirty (30) days thereafter will be subject to an additional 2% late fee on the unpaid balance.

A school may change their contract numbers by the following dates:

Schools attending between October and December (of the respective school year) must submit final numbers by Sept. 15th.

Schools attending between January and March (of the respective school year) must submit final numbers by Dec. 1st.

Schools attending between April and June (of the respective school year) must submit final numbers by February 1st.

In the event that a student attends the Outdoor School and must go home for a major circumstance (such as illness, death in the family, medical emergency) the Outdoor School reserves the right to charge for the dismissed student(s) in full; partial; or forgiven (non-charged) amount.

A student leaving within the first 24 hours of programming will typically be forgiven the due amount or be charged a partial fee of ¼ the 4-day rate. A student leaving between Day 2 and Day 4 of the program is typically charged the full tuition of \$285.00. All circumstances and rates determined are subject to change under the administration of The Los Padres Council, Boy Scouts of America & The Outdoor School at Rancho Alegre.

The student's public or private institution may also choose to refund the guardian of the respective student(s) in full or partial amounts based on transportation costs; in meeting 90% of the contracted amount; or other designated criteria.

Students that are sent home for disciplinary action at any time will not receive a refund.

Curriculum Hikes



The Outdoor School's curriculum embodies years of tradition blended with the best of place-based experiential education. Our Curriculum Hikes include teambuilding games, explorations and inquiries, hands-on science learning, and engaging activities linked together with direct experiences in nature. The themes and content of the five Curriculum Hikes are closely aligned with the California State Standards and Next Generation Science Standards for fifth and sixth grade.

- ❑ **Ecology Exploration** – the students discover the animals that live at ODS including their ecosystems, adaptations, food sources, and their relationships with other animals and humans.
- ❑ **Fire and Water Hike** the students learn about the water cycle, water science and fire ecology during this hike.
- ❑ **Dynamic Earth Hike** – the students search for fossils, identify, and classify rocks, and explore the geographical features of the Santa Ynez Mountains!
- ❑ **Astronomy and Nocturnal Animals** – this hike is the highlight of the week. The students face their fears of the dark, learn constellations and star gaze.
- ❑ **Closing Hike**– the students discuss the interactions between the Chumash culture and their environment including survival methods, food sources and how they lived with nature, and games!



Special Activities



Special activities are offered on Day Two and Three from 2-4 pm and Day Three from 8-9 pm. On Thursday afternoon we ask that a teacher or two go on the 9 mile ridge hike to assist the naturalist.

The following is a list of special activities that may be offered **(but not always)** at The Outdoor School:

9 mile ridge hike – archery– old man murphy – secret agent man – frog city – news press
– the lost redwood – survival hike – rock hopping – bat cave – gaga ball – oasis –
campfire stories – extreme camouflage – mountain biking – fossil hunting–
many MANY MANY more!

Cabin Groups

- ❑ Have the students select 2 or 3 friends for their cabin or you can choose what you feel is best for the group dynamic.
- ❑ Divide the students into even groups in all the cabins using the cabin/hiking group organization form.
- ❑ The other school(s) attending with you will divide their students equally and we will merge them. Each cabin will have students from each school unless requested otherwise and we have the space to separate schools.
- ❑ Be aware of the group dynamics of the cabin you have created – we want this to be a successful week for all students.
- ❑ Please fill out the organization form that was emailed to you by the Director. This form is for hiking and cabin groups and includes the meal information and student concerns. If you need this form again or have questions please email Amanda.Chick@scouting.org

Day One

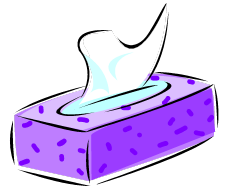
- 11:30 am with the Naturalists to review students' needs on hikes and special activities

Emergency Form

It is ESSENTIAL that all parents fill out The Outdoor School Student Health and Emergency form COMPLETELY (no student will be able to attend The Outdoor School without this form).



MEDICATIONS:

DUE TO CHANGING DISTRICT POLICIES, THE OUTDOOR SCHOOL DOES NOT PROVIDE MEDICATION FORMS. EACH SCHOOL NEEDS TO PROVIDE THEIR OWN MEDICATION FORMS BASED ON SCHOOL DISTRICT POLICY. **IN MANY CASES, MEDICATION CANNOT BE ADMINISTERED TO A MINOR WITHOUT THE PRE AUTHORIZATION, IN WRITING, FROM A DOCTOR, INCLUDING OVER-THE COUNTER DRUGS THAT WE STOCK LIKE BENADRYL, TYLENOL, IBUPROFEN, ANTIHISTAMINE LOTIONS, ETC.**

First aid

The Naturalist will provide first aid if the injury occurs on trail. Otherwise the student will be brought to the infirmary for first aid. First aid for minor accidents generally includes rest, ice, compression, elevation, wrapping of sprains, and cleaning and bandaging scrapes and cuts.

Emergencies

- ❖ Fever over 100 degrees – notify parents/guardians and the child should be sent home. Contact the Education Director or Lead Naturalist **before** calling the parents/guardians.
- ❖ Medical emergency
 - o Minor – A teacher, Education Director, Kitchen Director, Administrative Director, or Lead Naturalist will transport the injured student to Santa Ynez Valley Cottage Hospital (15 minutes). It is preferred that two adults transport students in a Rancho Alegre vehicle.
 - o Major – Immediately notify the Education Director. She will call (-911 and notify them of our location and then the parents/guardians will be notified
- ❖ All of The Outdoor School staff has first aid and CPR training
- ❖ **DO NOT CONTACT** parents/guardians without discussing the matter with the Education Director

Special needs

We welcome all students at The Outdoor School. If your students have a special need (sleep walking, bed-wetting, snoring, shyness, homesickness, health condition, dietary requirements, etc.), please do not hesitate to send her/him to The Outdoor School. Discuss any special needs of the student with her/his parents or guardians prior to departure. If you still have concerns, please feel free to call The Outdoor School Education Director at 904-703-0677

The Outdoor School is truly a place for all learners. The staff and administration are experienced in and able to accommodate most childhood issues from bedwetting to food allergies, mobility problems, shyness, snoring, behavioral disorders, health problems, and learning issues. That being said, the more we know in advance, and the more details you provide us with at the day one meetings, the better we are able to serve your learners.

If the special need involves **dietary restrictions**, please have the parents list substitution items on the health form. **Our kitchen staff needs to know what the student can have, not simply what s/he cannot. This is important to know so the kitchen staff know what they can make as a substitution for the student.**
